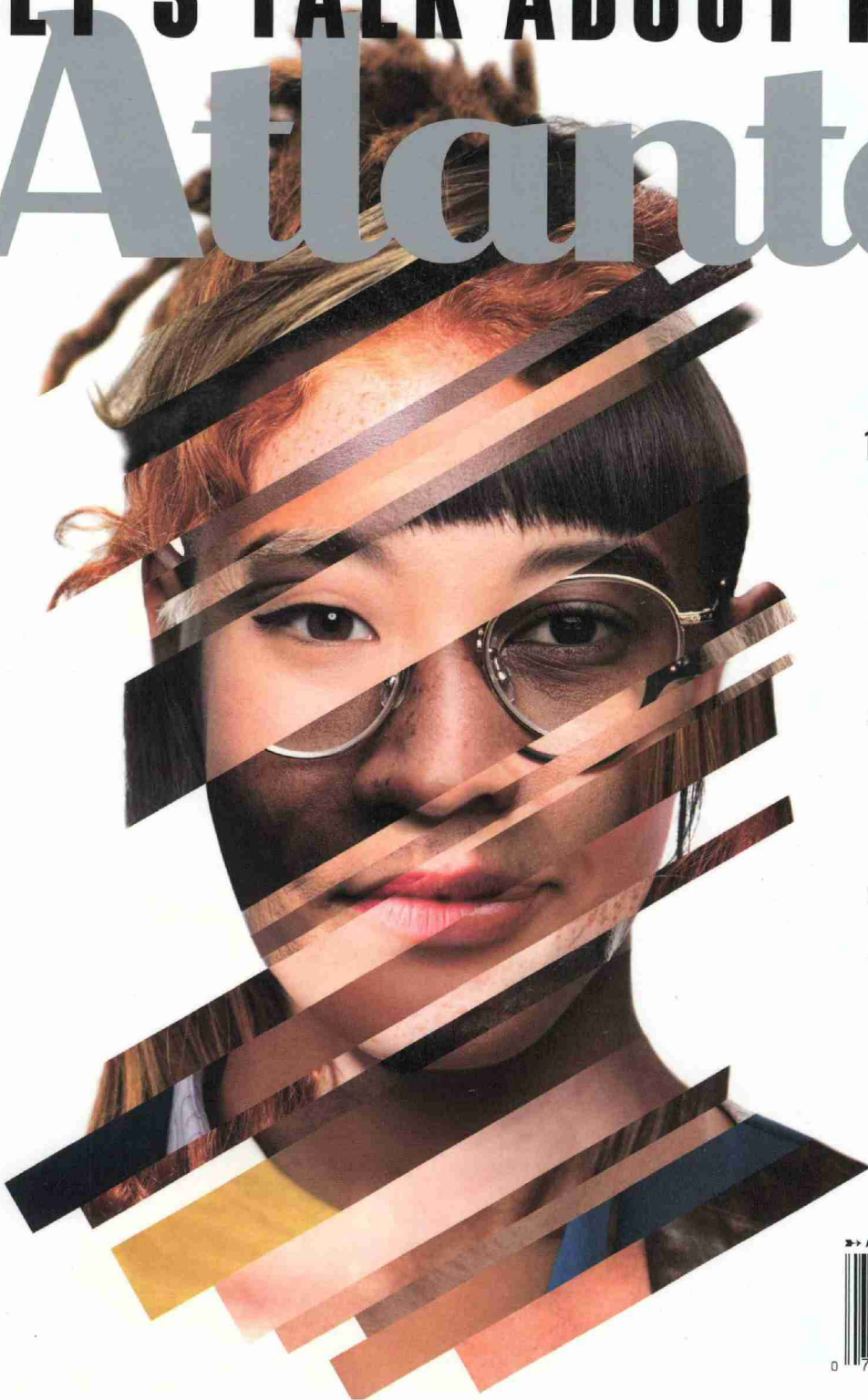


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BY THE NUMBERS

Number of bottles of Pimm's the Napoleon House goes through in a year to make its famous Pimm's cups.



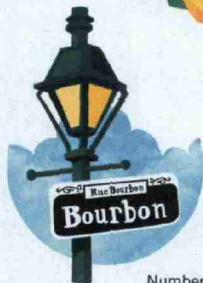
1,551
